CGR was engaged by New York State to analyze the potential impact of Edgemont becoming a village on both the residents of a potential village and those that would remain in the unincorporated areas of the Town of Greenburgh. This project looked at every service that would be impacted if Edgemont becomes a village and the range of financial impacts to both sets of residents. The goal of the report was to inform the entire community and particularly those who will be asked to vote on incorporation if this issue finally has its day at the ballot box. However, because of the complexity of creating a seventh village inside of a town with extensive services, many questions lacked definitive answers. The report was completed in April 2024 and the question of incorporation has not yet been brought before the voters. This presentation will review the study process, the key findings and provide any updates on the incorporation process.

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# Speed Limit Reduction: How to Establish Safe Speeds in Your Community\*

Jesse Vogl, AICP, Principal Transportation Planner, LaBella PC 11:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m., Soho Complex, 7th floor

Recent changes in New York State legislation have enabled municipalities to set area-wide speed limits as low as 25 mph compared to the previously permitted 30 mph minimum. This change from 30 mph to 25 mph can transform local communities by promoting safer speeds and roadway designs that benefit all roadway users. Yet before a new area-wide speed limit can be enacted, an engineering study is required to establish an appropriate speed limit that is safe, enforceable, fair, and accepted.

This course will review federal, state, and local guidance and best practices as they relate to establishing a 25-mph areawide speed limit. We will cover the requirements set forth in the Vehicle and Traffic Law (VTL) and Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) and NYS supplement for conducting a speed limit study, including identifying data needs and methods of analysis. In addition to the speed limit study, we will review steps to implementation, including signing requirements. Lastly, we will touch on additional engineering methods to calm traffic that may be implemented in conjunction with a speed limit reduction to achieve safe speeds and promote local roadways that are safe for all users.

## 2025 Awards Program Honorees


The recipient of our first-ever Lifetime Service Award is Town of Hempstead Deputy Supervisor Dorothy Goosby. First elected to the Hempstead Town Board in 1999, becoming the first African-American woman to serve on the board. Ms. Goosby became Senior Councilwoman in 2016 and then Deputy Supervisor in October 2012. Ms. Goosby is a longtime NYAOT Executive Committee member and past President (2014-2015) of NYAOT. In 2020, Ms. Goosby was honored by the Town of Hempstead when it renamed its plaza the Senior Councilwoman Dorothy L. Goosby Plaza.

Retired Supervisor Jean Raymond of the Town of Edinburg will receive a special proclamation recognizing her more than 30 years of public service -- 37 to be more exact. In 2023, she became the longest-serving supervisor on the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors. Ms. Raymond began her service with NYAOT in 1995, serving on the Resolutions Committee before her appointment to the Executive Committee in 2010, where she served through most of 2024, before her retirement.
